The author points out that this printing contains the longest series of lectures she has issued. The lectures were presented at a garden/orchard located at the rue d'Enfer in Mont-Parnasse. Freeman, Nicolas (Jay, A ed.). Le Glaneur ou Essais de Nicolas Freeman.

Freeman was an ex-patriot Scotsman who established as a wine merchant in near Bourdeaux, fleeing Scotland after the defeat at Culloden. He prospered and so did his family. The essays of his grandson are offered here. They were written throughout his life time and concern everything from an account of the Luxembourg gardens, the theater, painting, the arts. \$150



The text presents general principles that are necessary to the buildings and successfully propagating the selected plants. One of the better books on the topic. \$100

An important source for modern gardening and the foundation book for the so called mixed style. A book that was used throughout Europe and England in the late 19th century (color plate 8 of the book illustrates Sefton Park in Liverpool, designed by the author). Appended to the comprehensive text is a list of public and private parks (there are 30 private parks listed for the USA). Springer #76.

The book treats the cultivation of the four most prized and novel flowers of the day: the tulip, carnation, anemone, and primrose. The author mentions many of his fellow floriculturists in passing. Speechly was considered to be the best kitchen, fruit and forcing gardener of his time (Henrey p. 479). The book offered here is considered to be the most important book on the culture of the pineapple to appear in the 18th century (Henrey p. 481). Speechly benefited from an education and the fact that his employer sent him on a tour of the gardens of Holland in 1771 in order to compare Dutch forcing methods with the English. Henrey #1373.

A rare and wholly American work that contains one of the earliest dissertations on wine making and vine planting published in the United States. Pise` building is a method of construction that makes use of compacted soil to form load bearing walls for structures (a form of construction still used in parts of Asia). One of the plates in the book illustrates a building that was constructed by Johnson using this method. The section on wine is important because he draws upon local sources whom he identifies. Little is known about Johnson. He is, however, identified as being a correspondent of T Jefferson concerning the publication of this book and the book is dedicated to Jefferson. The railroad lines (including a proposed branch of the Great Southern) are shown as are the main turnpike roads. The broadside meas. appx. 21.5 x 31 inches. The text is a listing of the community appointments (schools, churches etc.) and the state of farming in the area. An important and ephemeral document. \$1,250

A recondite and encylcopaedic set of books. The author was a botanist and gardener. He was director of the agricultural garden and college at Karlsruhe. Pritzel #6219; Stafleu & Cowan #5890.

A handsome catalog of decorative pottery for formal or English style gardens. The Merrimac Pottery existed for appx. a decade prior to WWI. All of the urns, vases etc. were hand-made. The catalog illustrates, "... the adaptability of the pots to various positions in formal and wild gardens, on porches, verandas and terraces."

Both contained within a custom-made portfolio with cloth ties.


A stunning, large format catalog for all kinds of garden ornaments - for public and private use. There are also several pages for stable equipment, lamps, aquariums, garden seating, planters etc. Mott was a manufacturer of all kinds of metal goods and plumbing supplies. McKinstry citing

only much later printings of smaller catalogs; Romaine, p. 258 - citing a much later printing of this garden ornament catalog in the same large format as a "masterpiece". \$3,000

An informative and intriguing anonymous description of a 19th century nursery. highly unusual in its detail, and thoroughly obscure in its origins and purpose. Wilson's establishment was on Steinway Avenue in Astoria, Queens. It was on two large parcels of land, and judging by the extent of his operation, he was a nurseryman of substantial presence. The manuscript is divided into three sections: The first describes the contents, layouts. and temperatures of thirty-one sizable greenhouses on the property. These include many named varieties of palms, roses, camellias, bedding plants and ornamental annuals, bulbs, and plants grown for seed production. The second portion of this section, titled "Pépinieres et Jardin", includes plants grown for seasonal sale by the retail florist trade, such as lilies of the valley, pansies, and violets. There is a long list of plants imported by Wilson from nurseries in Savannah, GA, France and England. This is followed by a list of plants by variety, arranged by the proper time to be

propagated. The second section, titled "La Mosaiculture", is devoted to the fashionable ornamental borders of the period. It covers site selection, preparation of the ground, idea of color harmony and families of colors in garden design, a list of appropriate plants, and a series of 10 pencil diagrams of bedding designs keyed with specific plants to be used (in one instance of an oval layout, proposing an improvement: [trans.] "The ensemble should be longer in order to give more elegance to the design"). Considerable care was taken with the accuracy of the diagrams. In one instance and overlay has been applied as a correction. The final section is a transcribed tutor for business correspondence, in English, with sample letters for different

occasions. There are clues here and in the addenda at the end of the volume that the author may have been a travelling nursery salesman. It includes a priced wholesale list of roses offered to a London nursery, and a list of individuals and addresses in Baltimore, Md. But the detailed attention to William C. Wilson's establishment in Astoria (or Long Island City as it is noted) is unique.

Full and accurate descriptions of fruit trees; omitting apples. This 'second edition' is actually the remainder sheets of the 1831 first edition but with a new title page. The text derives from many sources but still has enough of the esteemed nurseryman's experience (and that of colleagues) in evidence to question Hedrick's dismissal of the book. S & S #14371; Hedrick, p. 478. This was part of a group of lovely remainder copies that turned up in the market in the 1980s. Now dispersed, they appear from time to time providing an opportunity to acquire an appealing artifact of the American horticultural bibliography.



This copy is clean throughout with excellent color and modest offsetting. The color overlays are in excellent condition. Printed on thick paper.

Contemporary three-quarter leather over paper boards. Later cloth slipcase.

"It is rather upon my opinion in writing than on the partial and imperfect manner in which my plans have sometimes been executed that I wish my fame to be established". Thus did Repton commence the book offered here. There is no more profound statement of the principles of the "English garden" than is offered herein. The book is, suitably, beautifully printed and sumptuously produced. It is not a book of theory but rather a record of the practical accomplishments of Repton's garden design ideas with an explanation of his aims and his methods of achieving them for his numerous clients. The book was originally published by subscription and then immediately re-printed (unaltered) with a total printing limited to 750 copies. Given the illustrations, format, and materials it was an expensive book. Millard, Architectural Collection, II, British Books, #66; Carter, Humphry Repton; Robinson, Introduction to Reprint, 1980. Natalie Bennett Blair née Knowlton built "Blairhame" (designed by Carrêre and Hastings) in Tuxedo Park, NY between the wars. She was a noted collector of American furnishings and antiques. \$4,250

The author's first book and the first book that was entirely devoted to designs for suburban dwellings. In the late 1820s the outskirts of London underwent rapid development planned by John Nash. Regents Park, St John's Wood, Paddington, Bayswater and the resort towns of Cheltenham, Tunbridge Wells etc. were the objects of Trendall's book. It is the first treatise entirely devoted to this "new" architecture that had only been treated sporadically. He also noted the need for designs of a, " ... more detailed and simple nature", hence the inclusion of instructions regarding windows (casement and sash), cornice (interior and exterior) construction, roof trusses, and moldings. Costs were included for each of the nine dwellings detailed in the 30 plates. In this issue the title page has had the mis-spellings corrected and the imprint changed from Trendall to Josiah Taylor. Trendall self-published (each plate has a legend as being published by him) this treatise and sold off sheets to enhance his sales.
