Hohman was the best known of the Pennsylvania German practical physicians and herbalists. The book offered here is a list of preparations for nearly every common illness encountered and is supplemented with a section of 70 pages devoted exclusively to veterinary practices (mostly for the horse). The book also contains a separate section on dyeing fabrics. The book was used and copies do not often appear in acceptable condition (note only three holdings in Austin; to be supplemented by two copies that we supplied over the past 20 yrs.)

Contemporary leather backed boards.

An elaborate semi-literate German dyer's manual with many recipes; accomplished in three different hands. Johannes Kaeck, the apparent compiler, lived in the town of Rottweil in southern Germany. Kaeck identifies himself on the elaborate calligraphic title page as a 'Zeugmacher', i.e., a tool maker or leather worker. The contents of the manuscript, however, indicate a very detailed interest in dyes, colors, and fabrics. The manuscript is in two parts. The first is appx. 144 pages in a single hand of German gothic script. This deals exclusively with dye recipes for colors. The colors are primarily blues, yellow, reds and greens of various hues. They are sometimes accompanied by notations as to the cloth (wool, Turkish wool, linen, and cotton) to be used. The recipes are quite advanced with advice on how to make the dyes permanent etc.. At one point in the manuscript the writer recommends the use of a 'soda' (sodium carbonate) to be gotten at a specific chemical factory outside Magdeburg. At another point he distinguishes between the dyes noted in the manuscript and the manufacture of chemical dyes. The second part

of the manuscript is appx. 75 pages. This appears to be in two distinct hands. The content varies with appx. half being given over to various cures and additional recipes and the remainder being mathematical puzzles ('magic squares'), geometry, lessons etc.. It seems likely that at one point this manuscript 'emigrated' to America and was used as a dyer's guide. There are occasional ref's. in English in a later hand that supplement a few of the dye recipes.

A rare and unusual PA German broadsheet with contemporary green and red color highlights. The broadsheet is adorned with woodcuts of angels with the verse and text printed within a large and ornate framework of flower and leaf blocks. The flowers and architectural ornamentation are highlighted in red with green wash. The broadsheet also bears a printed address or 'seal' on the verso (also in highlighted color); the address text is a variant of the located copy. It

appears as if the broadside was meant to be rolled and presented so that the seal would appear as an address to the recipient. The text lauds the birth of a child and the hopes for the dearly loved new life with assurances of a mother's love. In text, presentation, and printing the broadside is dramatic. It is printed on laid paper. There is a watermark that is most difficult to discern because of the over printing and coloring. It does appear, however, to be #PM 46 in Gravell. This is the Berks County, PA. paper mill of Isaac Copeland that ceased business in 1790. None of the illus. or decorative blocks used in the broadside are known to Reilly. The broadsheet meas. appx. 8.5 x 14 inches. Gottingen German Broadsides Database #912; absent from Evans. Arndt. S & S etc. The presentation is derivative in form from the German "Taufenpatenbrief or Godparent's letter" broadsheets of the 18th century. "It was customary in Germany for godparents to send their godchildren painted, handwritten, or printed good luck wishes on the occasion of their baptisms. These folded paper objects often contained small coins, and served as both a certificate of blessing and as religious instruction for young children: illustrated with scenes related to the meaning of baptism, they were preserved for the child's edification when he or she reached an appropriate age. In the 18th century printers developed a gamut of formats for these delightful paper-toy documents, which are now understandably rare." An excellent manuscript cook book of appx. 100 pages in at least two different hands. The manuscript is primarily devoted to desserts, puddings, cakes, ices and ice cream. It does contain meat and poultry, as well as a section on green vegetables, with some more exotic dishes. Overall the recipes depict a household of means. According to Woys Weaver the German element in American cooking was an influential one through the 1850s. Many of dishes offered here fall into the general categories suggested by Woys Weaver. There are also

examples of American English usage (beef-steak, Minet [sic] Julep) in the text or headings for recipes. This would lead one to think that the book made its way across the ocean with an emigrant and was used and modified here (in the south?). See Woys Weaver, The Larder Invaded, esp. p. 18. \$475

Zünd was a graduate of the Royal Austrian Veterinary School. A student of such notables as Bidl, Erdely, and Langenbacher. The book offered here is no simple summary of remedies. It is a complex medical tract on veterinary medicine and diseases of the horse. It is unlike other American books of the period because it is written from an informed scientific viewpoint. Prior to Zünd's tract such treatises were based on a folk medicine tradition that circulated as small pamphlets among the agricultural communities. It is doubtful that Zünd's informed and lengthy book had a wide audience (indicated by the fact that it was self-published) in the farming communities where traditional "remedies" would have been hard to supplant. The final 8 pages of text contain a German/English medical vocabulary, index to the text, a final index arranged by wound type for quick reference, and the errata. The book also bears the contemporary ownership signature of John L Meyer, Dec. 15, 1832. Tucher #2221; S & S #17203. \$575

"One of the most unusual of the German ballads" The tale is of a girl who visits paradise and returns after what



she believes is a few hours but in reality is over a century. According to Yoder this ballad was read, or sung to the tune of the hymn "Mein Gemüt erfreut sich". The story of the human bride-of-Christ can be found as early as the 13th century and has many variants. The broadside has 29 verses (Yoder translates the entire tale for his book) and is decorated with a superb hand colored woodcut of the subject. The ballad has 21 identified variant settings issued by different printers in the first four decades of the nineteenth century. The version offered

here has one location at the Free Library of Philadelphia; it is absent from American Imprints. See Yoder, PA German Broadside, pp. 63 - 66; PSU copy (defective) is a much later variant. \$4,500

Villee was an interesting character in the print world of the Pennsylvania Germans. He was a printer, jobber, and publisher in the 1820s producing a number of books and broadsides for himself and others. He was a firm believer in subscribed printings. In 1828 he printed a large broadside soliciting subscriptions for a multi-volume human anatomical atlas that was published in Germany with bi-lingual text. The book offered here is unique among the PA Germans since it offers technical instruction and theoretical concepts for rural communities. One of the most elaborate of the PA German devotional prints. The coloring - utilizing 5 different colors - is unusual within a genre known for its spare decorative elaboration. The theme is well known. It is based on the Gospel of Matthew: "Because strait is the gate and narrow is the way, which leadth to life, and few there be that find it" (Matt. 7, 13 - 14). The fearsome pit of fire, populated with demons, is well rendered in the lower right

portion of the print - prominent before the observer.

Despite its blemishes a well preserved copy with excellent coloring. See Yoder, Pennsylvania German Broadside, pp. 188 - 190; Wellenreuther, Citizens in a Strange Land.

One suspects, however, this did not receive much circulation given the fact that German Mennonites had a reputation as excellent



distillers of Rye whiskey. Unlocated. See Yoder p. 39, for a later broadside printing of a similarly named song; absent from Penn State German Language Broadsides. \$975



The report was the first official support for the project. He served in various state positions before finally running for the governorship with support of the Whigs and "Know Nothings". He served one term (until 1858) before voluntarily retiring. DAB XV, 49-50.

The earliest veterinary manual available in colonial America. It is based on a continental publication of 1716.

What is new in Saur's printing are the appendices. The first two appearing in 1770 and then here, the third 12 page appendix, appearing for the first time. This third appendix - a full signature - bears the provenance statement that its contents had been drawn from printed and other "mundgezogenen" sources. It contains folk cures for all kinds of veterinary ailments (even tells you how to select the best cow in the market) and finally ends with two sections devoted to the ailments of geese and chickens. It is apparent that this was an afterthought to attract attention to a useful book for the farm and thereby enhance sales. The text is lengthy and after treating ailments of the horse provides cures for various livestock ailments. A difficult book to find in trade and complete since it was used to destruction. She was to receive full lodging, apparel, five quarters of "day schooling", and at the end of her term of indenture her clothes and \$10. in payment. Signed by Johannes Schuster and marked by his daughter with an "X".

I have seen two other copies with the same tools and spelling on the label (the binder has mis-spelled "Gesundheits" on the spine label in the same way in order to fit it in; the spine tooling is unique to copies examined - it utilizes a "snowflake" and "chrysanthemum" tool in an alternating pattern). There is nothing like it in the Papantonio or Maser Collection catalog. PA German medical works of this period rarely received this kind of decorative embellishment. There are several appendices to the text beginning at page 118. The first provides recommendations for fruits, herbs, and roots to be kept in

the house (22 pp.); useful formulae for all kinds of colors, preservatives, and "secrets" (10 pp.); controlling harmful insects (4 pp.); hints for hunters and fishermen (4 pp.); two separate lists of medicines and pharmaceutical ingredients to be had off the land (6 pp.). The printing is attributed to the press of Moser and Peters on the basis of type. An unusually clean copy of an uncommon book, and rare in this condition. Arndt #2793; S&S #26020.

A most unusual manual of folk remedies and herbal compounds that contains 470 numbered paragraphs of succinct medical formulae, cures and advice for man and animals. The copy offered here is without the title page that bears the Kurtz imprint. The listed title is taken from the copy at the NLM


(http://resource.nlm.nih.gov/8308472). At some point close to the publication date the title page was cancelled. So what appears in the text is the truncated drop-title at the head of the text on page 1, thus omitting the imprint and title reference to the manuscripts of the famous Virginia physician that are, as Kurtz claimed, the basis for the text (!) The copy offered here is bound in a contemporary cloth backed boards. A coarse type of muslin was used as the backing and is the same on the three copies that have come into our possession. The bindings are identical on all the copies (the pattern and color of the marbled paper are the same on two copies with the third having a color variant in the marbling). The books derive from one source, and appear to have been bound in this manner so that they could be offered while masking the printer and the origin. The book is unlike anything Kurtz printed during his career (see Durnbaugh, "Henry Kurtz, Man of the Book" in Ohio History, v. 76, #3, 1967) - i.e., religious periodicals, hymnals, ABCs.

In the early nineteenth century, German Lutheran families came to settle the Dushore area from Berks, Luzerne and Columbia Counties. The first regular Lutheran pastor in this area was Rev. Carl Ludwig Erle. He was born in 1805 at Muenden, Hanover, Germany and arrived at New York City, 1824. He was accepted as a candidate for the ministry by the Ministerium of Pennsylvania which sent him to develop congregations in what was then known as the Cherry Valley mission field. He was licensed by the Ministerium in 1840 and ordained May 21, 1845 at Reading; he was paid by the Ministerium's Missionary Society. From the beginning of his pastorate, Rev. Erle had four preaching locations: Friedens (Peace), Zion, Eberly's (St. John's), and Belletemer (probably Bella Sylva). Eventually, the first three were organized into regular congregations. St. John's and Zion had always been united and were known as the Dushore Parish. The Zion congregation was established by Pastor Erle in his own home about two miles east of Dushore. What year the congregation was organized has not been determined (Groesbeck genealogy). The manuscript appears to have been part of



his ordination requirement - Erle was identified as early as 1835 as "candidate" in the Minutes of the Annual Convention of the Evangelical Lutheran Ministerium - and does provide insight to the kind of informed, educated resource available to the rural population through the offices of the church. The final 60 pages of the manuscript are a "day-book" autobiographical record of Erle's life in the church covering the years 1840 - 1842.



Rare. The printing press at the Ephrata Cloister in Pennsylvania issued few books with a "practical" nature and fewer still that could be considered medical. When they did, the books were used to the point of destruction in the population of the surrounding countryside. Copies that survive, especially in this "as issued" condition, are most desirable. The text is supplemented by a section on materia-medica and dyeing recipes. The body of the text offers directions for mid-wives and difficult births. 



Gennert, a German immigrant to the United States, lived most of his life (1854 - 1935) in New York City. He apparently spent time in Pennsylvania, given the





references in this diary. It is an unusual compilation of a self aware, curious individual with political and artistic interests. He served as a drummer boy for the 96th New York Regiment during the Civil War (a mounted photograph in uniform in the diary is self-identified) and had a career as an electrical inventor who held several patents assigned to the Manhattan Brass Company and E P Gleason Manufacturing Co. The diary however, does not deal with his business accomplishments. It is focused on events, places, historical incidents, architecture, and people he knew. It is retrospective and apparently accomplished in the last decade of his life. Gennert lived through one of the most transformative periods in American history, including WWI and then the stock market crash of 1929. The overall tone of the diary is patriotic and suffuses the entries throughout. Despite this he could also be quite acid in his observations on society or the actions of those around him or in political life. There are several illustrated scenes of what could only have been childhood reminiscences of Pennsylvania country life that are unlikely to be recorded elsewhere. A remarkable, illustrated, record of a life.

During the 18th century Mennonite schoolmasters in rural areas would often convey pious wisdom and the technique of forming German letters to their students by presenting their best pupils with beautiful calligraphy and decorated religious texts known as Vorschriften. Egelmann was a Reading schoolmaster and engraver. He issued this handsomely engraved booklet made up of Vorschriften for use by students as a writing manual. It contains numerous examples of different calligraphic styles accompanied by renderings of animals, scenes, and an allegorical representation in a distinctly 'primitive' style. In 1984 the Library Company of Philadelphia organized an exhibition of German life in the Philadelphia region during the 18th and 19th century. Egelmann's booklet was exhibited. The catalog for the exhibit makes passing reference to four editions between 1820 and 1831 (Nash cites only three). A superb example of early American provincial engraving and book making as well as childhood education. Nash, #134; Arndt #2522 citing an [1820?] edition (#2469) with one location, but in fact most likely 1825-'26. \$1.250

Muffley, Moffley, or Moffly the spelling varies through the extant legal record. Samuel Moffly (1789 - 1878) was the son of Joseph Moffly (who died in 1823) who lived in Richland Township. At the age of 16 Samuel, apparently a precocious boy, was teaching school and undertook contract "fancy" work as a scrivener. There are at least 7 known examples, all dated 1805, of his fraktur penmanship (see the list in the Earnest entry noting the preponderance of known examples were the result of one horde uncovered at the home of Charles Ort of Quakertown). The cyphering notebook offered here when Samuel was 12 years old - is illustrative of his incipient artistic efforts. The illustration is of the full page frontispiece to the notebook. The notebook is a 92 page record of various mathematical rules and problems (with an occasional illustration). It is unknown if he carried on with his fraktur illustration since there are no known examples recorded after 1805. Accompanying the notebook is a single sheet of incomplete fraktur calligraphy (uncolored) and the priced auction sale inventory of the estate of Joseph Moffly in 1824.
