This is the first English translation of vol. 4 of the first edition of Thenard's classic Traité de Chemie Élémentaire. The editor has added additional notes from other volumes of the other original. It was, at the time, one of very few books on chemical analysis in the English language. See Cole #1262 note; Neville II, p. 542 - stating that the book was considered to be "scarce" by Zeitlinger in 1915.

A most interesting Whytt title in which he addresses two key issues: the first essay deals with the circulation of the blood in the capillaries; the second is his commentary on Haller's theories of nerve irritation. Whytt's essay on capillary blood flow is a milestone in the literature and the most important work in the field after the discovery by Leeuwenhoeck. Whytt reviewed the printed literature of the subject and drastically criticized all of it (see Fishman). He also drew the correct conclusion as to its nature and source. The second essay is an important first step in his own neurological work for which he is remembered. See G-M for author's other work; Fishman, p. 371 - 2; Garrison, Neuro.. \$2,750

There is a startling, dramatic section of the head and ear. Saunders is best known for his book on the eye. He was the first to advise paracentesis in acute middle ear supparation. An important book and early American color plate production. The book utilizes an American made paper of a particular kind that naturally darkens over the years. 



The Loriot is his announcement of having 'rediscovered' the secret of the Romans for making mortar. He describes the method and gives several recipes - rapidly copied and adapted by the English - and variations including the production of a waterproof version. 

A complete course of instruction for artillery founded on the technology and weaponry of the period of Friederich Wilhelm (1688 -1740) that is cited in the text by the author. The text goes from ballistic charts, calculations and design of calipers to gun carriages, shot, auxiliary equipment for servicing the artillery (with an unusual chart[s] on the cost calculations for various calibers of artillery), fortification of batteries, etc. The text is divided into three major sections with sections two and three proving the most interesting. Section two is devoted to the Haubitze (howitzer) and mortar. The howitzer having the advantage in distance as opposed to the "throw" weight that could be lifted by the mortar. Metal composition, designs (breech design for the howitzer was "funnel shaped" - a major innovation) are all covered. Section three is devoted to "büchsenmeisterei" wherein all manner of shot from incendiary, stone, and illumination shells are covered (configurations illustrated) and recipes given. The illustrations reveal a profound knowledge of the technology. An impressive, early 18th century military manuscript. \$1,950

There are variations between this manuscript and the final printed version in Fresh Fields. Burroughs is best known for his naturalist writings and close friendship with Whitman. In his younger days he travelled to Jamaica, Bermuda, Hawaii, and Yosemite (with Muir). Fresh Fields was a product of these travels and it was fitting that this essay on sailing as an experience of distance and vacancy should be the final contribution included in that volume. Both writings address optimizing sexual performance for both pleasure and procreating - the latter proposed as more of a happy by-product in Kirchwey, who openly advocated for changing moral and social attitudes towards women's pleasure. 

The Pennsylvania Dutch contributed many items to the inventory of popular folk medicine in the 19th century. Chief among them was the "cure" for hydrophobia offered by Pastor Heinrich Wilhelm Stoy - who actually studied medicine in Germany before emigrating to Lebanon, Pennsylvania in 1767 where he set up practice. His botanical remedies were well known and part of the fund of popular knowledge marketed under his name and used - unacknowledged - by others touting their wares. His broadsides and handbills were printed throughout central Pennsylavania long after his death and well into the 19th century. Less well known were the efforts of his competitors and successors. Valentine Kettering (1776 -1836) was a resident of Dauphin County who advertised an "unfailing cure". The instructions presented here are most likely by Kettering. He offered a cure using a chickweed compound, i.e., Gauchheil or Huhnerdarm as it was known in Europe - both cited in the brief autograph additions in the provided spaces in one of the broadsides. He also refers to it as Annagalis arvensis (scarlet pimpernel) in the additions. The provision necessitating autograph additions for the essential curative element, against a background text of generic preparation details, is an obvious marketing ploy that assures payment for the "secret". It is rare to encounter a surviving example. See Yoder p. 111; OCLC cites only the Library Company. \$625

An early, remarkable set of views illustrating aspects of the territory, commerce, and culture. Some of the places illustrated are Ketchikan, Treadwell, and Juneau and what appears to be the Yukon River and settlements. The Alaskan gold mining firm (ATGM Co.) was incorporated in 1890 based on Douglas Island in the Gastineau Channel across from Juneau - they are all photographed. Other discoveries are certain, e.g., the Poodledog Cafe shows







up, Yukon stern wheeler, Royal Alexander Hotel (not the one in Winnipeg). The presence of internal evidence - names, geographic peculiarities, buildings - in the photographs will lead to the identification and location of most scenes. The technical aspects of the photographs is explained in Lavédrine / Gandolfo's book The Lumière Autochrome, History, Technology (see pp. 30-33). It was around this time that numerous technical advances in color photography were introduced (notably flexible film support, evident in these examples, for emulsions to replace the ubiquitous glass plate). The leader in the field were the Lumière Bros. in France. Efforts by Kodak were dependent on sub-contracted work carried out in

California by Technicolor. It was not until much later that Kodak succeeded in introducing the color negative to produce color prints. A unique set. \$8,500
