

The first issue of the lithographic press located at the West Point Military Academy. This manual was printed for the small number of cadets as a reference and text for a series of lectures in the production of bombs, rockets. and explosive shells. It is the most comprehensive and elaborate of any of the six technical manuals issued for exclusive use of the cadets. It is comprised of 56 pages of lithographed text followed by 24 lithographed plates. The plates are line drawings depicting the step by step manufacture of all kinds of explosive and rocket propelled ordnance. Little is known about the origin and duration of this lithographic press at West Point. It is, however, known that in the following year Poorterman was replaced by another lithographer by the name of George Aspinwall. The manual was produced under the direction of Mahan who, after completing his course of scientific and engineering studies in France, was appointed to teach at the Academy. He oversaw the establishment of new professional standards at was at the time the only engineering college in America. See "Technology and Culture" for Jan. and April of \$4,500

The original publication of the lecture outlines of Robison's notable series on the physical sciences. Robison succeeded Black to the lectureship in chemistry at Glasgow and eventually was prof. of natural philosophy at Edinburgh. The book offered here is his lecture outline for the course he gave. They contain an extensive structure of associated topics and mathematics. Robison remarks in the introduction that the main points of his lectures are present in the outline and that none of the proofs were there because he relied on students in class to take extensive notes. These student notes were the basis for the posthumous publication in 1822 of a four volume set supposed to encompass the lectures. DSB XI, 495 - `98; DNB XVII, 57 - 58; see Roberts Cat. p. 280. An elaborate semi-literate German dyer's manual with many recipes; accomplished in three different hands.

Johannes Kaeck, the apparent compiler, lived in the town of Rottweil in southern Germany. Kaeck identifies himself on the elaborate calligraphic title page as a 'Zeugmacher', i.e., a tool maker or leather worker. The contents of the manuscript, however, indicate a very detailed interest in dyes, colors, and fabrics. The manuscript is in two parts. The first is 144 pages in a single hand of German gothic script. This deals exclusively with dye recipes for colors. The colors are primarily blues, yellow, reds and greens of various hues. They are sometimes accompanied by notations as to the cloth (wool, Turkish wool, linen, and cotton) to be used. The recipes are quite advanced with advice on how to make the dyes permanent etc.. At one point in the manuscript the writer recommends the use of a 'soda' (sodium carbonate) to be gotten at a specific chemical factory outside Magdeburg. At another point he distinguishes between the dyes noted in the manuscript and the manufacture of chemical dyes. The second part of the manuscript is appx. 75 pages. This appears to be in two distinct hands. The content varies with appx. half being given over to various cures and additional recipes and the remainder being mathematical puzzles ('magic squares'), geometry, lessons etc.. It seems likely that at one point this manuscript 'emigrated' to America and was used as a dyer's guide. There are occasional ref's. in English in a later hand that supplement a few of the dye recipes. \$6.500



A unique copy of this bible from the Yaukey (Yocky) family. The Goeb printing of Luther's bible in Somerset is





historic in itself; especially so given the generous format Goeb chose for his work. What makes this copy unique is the laid-in copies of three printed hymns; two from "Sisters" of the Ephrata Cloister but all originating at Snow Hill. Catherine Redelsberger and Barbara Schneeberger (for whose family farm the Snow Hill sanctuary was named) were among the earliest American women converts to Beissel's Seventh-Day Baptists. Andreas Schneeberger is represented here by a hymn printed at the Cloister on laid paper clearly watermarked CB in a "fluttering heart" (Gravell, #198). It is most likely that the Redelsberger hymn was also printed at the Cloister but there is no watermark. The three broadside printings are:

- 1] Der Schw. Catharina Redelsberger Glaubens-Lied. Unlocated.
- 2] Geistliches Trauer-Lied, gestellt von Schw. Barbara Schneeberger. Unlocated
- 3] Wurde abgesungen den 31ten August, 1793: Bey B. A. S. auf dem jährlichen Fest, an der Antitum. Printed at the Cloister. Attributed to Andreas Schneeberger. Shipton & Mooney #26144 with the entry taken from Seidensticker and no location provided. There apparently is one copy at HSP.

These ephemeral publications were sold through western Pennsylvania by itinerant peddlers or after meetings (see Yoder pp. 42 - 44 barely noting any from the 18th century). Few survive. The three offered here must have been acquired by the Yaukey family 20 years before the Goeb bible was printed and retained for generations within the family. They are spotted and toned and irregularly trimmed – but all are complete. The Fraktur bookplate in the bible is large (285 x 230 mm). It is a




A manuscript kept by lieutenant E J Cordes in the French Navy on board the Corréze and the Javeline (gun boats) supervising the waterways of Cochinchina (mainly Cambodia and Vietnam) during two years of service from 1879 to 1881. There are approximately 40 pen & ink drawings illustrating the text (several full-page), most notably a series of sketches of temples, pavilions and



statues at Angkor Wat and Angkor Thom. The manuscript is prefaced by a detailed 4-page autograph letter dated 21 June 1884, signed by Cordes to a prospective publisher which outlines the contents of the

manuscript, the form of publication he envisages, even outlining the number of volumes he foresees in the finished work. Indeed, this manuscript does appear to have been once in an editor's hands, albeit briefly - a number of early leaves are blue-lined and contain some editorial remarks, amendments, and redactions, but these occur in only the first 100 pages or so. One must assume that the project was deemed too costly to produce, and indeed I have found no evidence of any part of it having been published. The manuscript includes a detailed, but confusing, table of contents consisting of a "descriptive correspondence" and an "intimate correspondence" which makes the collation of the two somewhat confusing in early parts where an editor's hand has been at play. The manuscript has been arranged in "cahiers" (i.e. fascicles) numbered 1-287, all of which are present. Due to some marginal creasing and tears, and Cordes' penchant for writing into the margins, a number of words have obviously been lost but in most all respects the sense remains clear. The basic itinerary has Cordes leaving from Toulon on 20 January 1879, aboard the Corrèze, and ends at Châu Dôc, in the Mekong Delta more than two years later, on 28 February, 1881. The voyage out takes him through the Mediterranean Sea via Isle d'Hyères, Corsica, and Sardinia to Egypt, Port Said, the Suez Canal in the Red Sea, then from Aden to Ceylon, through the Straits of Malacca to Singapore and Sumatra. The voyage out occupies approximately 80 pages; the balance is concentrated on Cambodia and Vietnam: i.e.: Saigon, Mytho, Dinh, Bien Hoa, Gocoug, Chau-Doc, Vinh-Long, Sa-Dec, Long-Xuyen, Can-Tho, Tay Ninh, Phnom Penh, Tra-Vinh, Co-Chien, Siem Reap. Grand Vaico, Cai Lai, Tra Vinh, My-Tho, Long-Phu,

Angkor, Ban-Tre, Phnom-Baké and others, with much time spent, obviously, on the rivers and waterways of the region, including the Mekong and the Tonlé Sap. Based on their time in Saigon this seems to be the home base. The author writes very clearly and delivers his impressions and observations rather beautifully, as he gives some glimpses of the life of both the natives and the colonists, the food, costume, customs, weather, the countryside, river craft and river culture.



His four trips into Cambodia, what with their series of pen and ink sketches and the unusual architecture, are among the most impressive parts of the manuscript. Thus, in Angkor Thom: "All around, marvelously chiseled foundations, cornices, medallions as beautiful as those of Angkor Wat, but more degraded and sad to see by the light of our torches. Above our heads a high vault in which we find the bawling of the bats and where we see cracks, crevasses, with a piece of blue sky glimpsed through some root or some branch of liana lit by a ray of sun. We walk, we always walk, groping, with a thousand precautions, lowering the torches to see the projection of the blocks, taking the pace one behind the other, blowing no word and we arrive at the other end of this gallery which had to be formerly of great splendor. ... In a last effort, we set foot on a vast platform relatively clear of trees and lianas, perfectly flat, where the sun plays and where awaits us the most extraordinary spectacle, the most unheard of, the more unexpected, the most splendid, the strangest it is possible to imagine...From the platform arise the towers, some large, others small, quite similar to each other carrying, in cameo, and looking at the four cardinal points, large figures carved from three to four meters height. Brahma's heads, with their mysterious glances, embedded in the tower like precious stones in a goldsmith's piece, are fantastic, like a fairy-tale decoration, something dreamed of in a hallucination but unsuitable for Reality, impossible and real...." The 'outpost' of Saigon is described. Being the seat of local government inspires Cordes to reflect on the nature of French administration and how it differs from the English and Spanish colonial governments. There is an interesting description of the new, modern city of

Saigon that is un-populated as juxtaposed to an outlying area known as Cholon that is a buzzing hub of commerce and industry inhabited by thirty thousand people. The 1240 page manuscript is brimming with details, and impressions of the country. At points it is difficult to identify locations because of changes in nomenclature of modern maps of the area. The author's narrative, however, carries the reader along. \$26,500

A commemorative record (unique?) of an iron light house appx. 8 stories tall. There is nothing that remains on the island to show that it ever existed. The Ship Island Shoal is appx. 7 miles long and opposite Gulfport and Biloxi off the Mississippi Gulf Coast. William Buel Franklin was educated at West Point, accompanied the Kearny Expedition west (1845), and took part in the Mexican-American War. Upon his return he taught for several

years at West Point and was then appointed by the War Dept. as Army Engineer Secretary of the Light House Board where he was responsible for constructing several light houses along the Atlantic coast. In 1859 he was appointed to oversee the construction of the Capitol dome. After the Civil War he was employed by the Colt Fire Arm Co. There appears to be no record of the Ship Island Shoal Light House. DAB VI, 601-602.

The Italian town of Osoppo sits northwest of Udine and demarcates the westernmost point of defense for the old Venetian Republic that ended with the French - Austrian Treaty of Campo Formio ceding Venice to Austrian rule. Napoleon himself is supposed to have sat at the heights



of the fortress in Osoppo and opined that it was a natural barrier and defensive point for all travel from the Alps down to the coast. Hence its occupation by the French. The Treaty proved short-lived and the fortress changed hands a number of times between 1797 and 1814. It appears that this plan follows from a French occupation and reveals numerous details of that occupation and its strategic importance. Beginning in the early 16th century a fortress had been established on the high ground; here the Casa Savoignano is placed and identified apparently as a reminder of this legacy. \$550



The author's first book and the first book that was entirely devoted to designs for suburban dwellings. In the late 1820s the outskirts of London underwent rapid development planned by John Nash. Regents Park, St John's Wood, Paddington, Bayswater and the resort

towns of Cheltenham, Tunbridge Wells etc. were the objects of Trendall's book. It is the first treatise entirely devoted to this "new" architecture that had only been treated sporadically. He also noted the need for designs of a, " ... more detailed and simple nature", hence the inclusion of instructions regarding windows (casement and sash), cornice (interior and exterior) construction, roof trusses, and moldings. Costs were included for each of the nine dwellings detailed in the 30 plates. In this issue the title page has had the mis-spellings corrected and the imprint changed from Trendall to Josiah Taylor. Trendall self-published (each plate has a legend as being published by him) this treatise and sold off sheets to enhance his sales. An important book by a founding and key member of the early Rookwood Pottery works. The title page lists him as

formerly being the Superintendent of the Rookwood Pottery. Given the status of the pottery in the history of American decorative arts at the end of the nineteenth century this book is virtually unique in the community for its open discussion of clay composition and formulation of glazes. He, along with Mary Louise McLaughlin, were the source of the innovative techniques and glazes produced for Rookwood, whose founder, Maria L Nichols Storer, hired them both. Mc Laughlin codified a good deal of her work in her publications, e.g., her rare early 96 pp. pamphlet, Pottery Decoration Under the Glaze, published in Cincinnati by Robert Clarke in 1880. Langenbeck who was an early associate in the years before she founded the Rookwood Pottery, who provided instruction to Storer in China painting. His role expanded after he was hired and the pottery was a success. In those early years Cincinnati was a "hotbed" of ceramic innovation and within a decade spawned a number of competitive enterprises and drew a number of talented beginners into the field, e.g., Artus van Briggle. Langenbeck's work was fundamental to each of these since his approach was through the chemistry of the clay and glazes and changes imparted by altered formulae rather than the traditional "mechanical" consideration of working the clay. An attractive diploma, enhanced by Seymour's large, accomplished, and original engraved view of the Pennsylvania Hospital building done in 1811. Seymour worked with W R Birch in producing his famous illustrated

book, The City of Philadelphia .... ("Birch's Views") but is best remembered for his pioneering work, along with Titian Peale, as official artist of the Long Expedition to the Missouri River in 1819 and the Platte River in 1820. Seymour was tasked to " ... furnish sketches of landscapes, whenever we meet with any distinguished for their beauty or grandeur... [and] to paint miniature likenesses, or portraits if required, of distinguished Indians, and exhibit groups of savages engaged in celebrating their festivals, or sitting in council, and in general illustrate any subject, that may be deemed appropriate to his art." The result was a series of iconic watercolors and paintings of Native Americans and the West. It is worth noting that the view of the hospital offered here was not part of Birch's original book. It is a separate rendering by Seymour (the book does contain an awkward, muted view of the landmark building). See Ewers. Artists of the Old West. \$750

The book is often viewed as a supplement to Wilson's Ornithology because it describes 60 birds not included by Wilson (e.g., Wild Turkey, the Burrowing Owl, and the Zenaida Dove). The plates are mostly by Titian Peale with at least the part of one plate being by Audubon (The Great Crow Blackbird is notable for being the first book appearance of any engraving after John James Audubon). 

It is not an excise rule but has scales for gauging, stocktaking, alcohol percentage, profit, proof and other similar calculations. Farmar's spirit slide rule was a tool used, among other things, to calculate how much water is needed to reduce the strength of a liquor. The calculation

is not complex. It is, however, tricky because of the fact that when alcohol and water are mixed there is a net contraction in the volume, thereby introducing an error into the "proof" result which is based on volumes. It is from this that the proper excise tax was calculated. Hence the importance of an accurate measure of "proof". Farmar's is the first rule to account for this. Woodward is considered to be the preeminent synthetic organic chemist of the twentieth century, having made many key contributions to the subject, especially in the synthesis of complex natural products and the determination of their molecular structure. He worked

closely with Roald Hoffmann on theoretical studies of chemical reactions. He was awarded the Nobel Prize in Chemistry in 1965 (as was Hoffmann in 1981). He spent his career at Harvard. By the 1960s he was appointed Donner Professor of Science devoting the balance of his career to pure research, free of any teaching responsibility. Many of Woodward's syntheses were described as spectacular by his colleagues and before he did them it was thought by some that it would be impossible to create these substances in the lab. Woodward's syntheses were also described as having an element of art in them, and since then, synthetic chemists have always looked for elegance as well as utility in synthesis. His work also involved the exhaustive use of the then newly developed techniques of infrared spectroscopy and later, nuclear magnetic resonance spectroscopy. Another important feature of Woodward's syntheses was their attention to stereochemistry or the particular configuration of molecules in three-dimensional space. Most natural products of medicinal importance are effective, for example as drugs, only when they possess a specific stereochemistry. This creates the demand for 'stereoselective synthesis', producing a compound with a defined stereochemistry. While today a typical synthetic route routinely involves such a procedure, Woodward was a pioneer in showing how, with exhaustive and rational planning, one could conduct reactions that were stereoselective. Many of his syntheses involved forcing a molecule into a certain configuration by installing rigid structural elements in it, another tactic that has become standard today. In this regard, especially his syntheses of reserpine and strychnine were landmarks. In the early 1960s, Woodward began work on what was the most


complex natural product synthesized to date—vitamin B12. The work was finally published in 1973, and it marked a landmark in the history of organic chemistry. The synthesis included almost a hundred steps, and involved the characteristic rigorous planning and analyses that had always characterized Woodward's work. That same year, based on observations that Woodward had made during the B12 synthesis, he and Roald Hoffmann devised rules (now called the Woodward–Hoffmann rules) for elucidating the stereochemistry of the products of organic reactions. Woodward formulated his ideas (which were based on the symmetry properties of molecular orbitals) based on his experiences as a synthetic organic chemist. \$2,000







history of the island had included 32 pp. of illustrated fern examples. In 1878 the following newspaper notice





appeared in the Daily Gleaner: "You must ask to see Mr. Gall's collection of Jamaica Ferns, collected from all parts of the island, very beautifully preserved, and mounted on card-board, each Sheet containing a very large variety of Ferns. 


